2022 Annual Report of Pastor MacLean, Lead Pastor

Hope Family,

Grace and peace be unto you from God our Father and our Lord Jesus Christ.

What a season it has been in our society and in our congregation. Due to the disruption and changes brought about by the pandemic, I have a sense of what athletes deal with when weather causes a delay. The uncertainty of what to expect can cause frustration and worry. The muscles and the mind, keyed for the event, are now kept warm on a stationary bike and through mental drills...but it's not the same. It's not the way it's "supposed to be."

We can't always choose our situation, but we can choose how we respond. The great athletes are the ones who adapt. This past year was a time that many in our society strove to "return to normal." As our congregation has returned to regular gatherings, we have seen many folks return from extended times away up north, distanced for health reasons, and (like athletes picking up the game where they left off after the delay) working the kinks out of their life. It has been a joy to see more and more returning and new faces in worship as we celebrate TOGHETHER what God has done and is doing for and through us. Though our regular practices were upset, our commitment to our mission To Know Christ and To Make Christ Known never wavered.

In this past year, we've relished a return of practices we had missed, and we've embraced new opportunities to engage in our mission. We are a dynamic and enthusiastic congregation that continues to grow post-pandemic. I am thrilled by the number of small groups we have added this year and grateful for those who serve as leaders for them. The challenge for each of us to invite two new people to experience God's grace through the ministries of Hope was taken up by many, and we've had the joy of sharing life and faith with new friends throughout the year.

The welcoming and encouraging spirit of our congregation is evident at all three locations where we gather for worship and life together. The challenges of the pandemic have left their mark on the world and on us, but the pressure and heat of a situation that threatens to break communities can also *temper* them. Tempering is the process of making metal more durable and resilient. It requires both heat and pressure to be done. I believe this is what we have experienced in this season of change.

As for myself, I have been going through my own season of tempering. The busy-ness of life has increased with our building plans and capital appeal for the expansion of ministries at Hope Lake Weir Campus and Hope Central Campus, and the building of our new facilities in the southern Villages. I've worked with agencies from the Synod, Lutheran Services of Florida, STS, neighboring pastors, Lutheran Counseling Services, and others to reengage or expand on how Hope can partner with them in new ways.

It has also been a year of personal tempering, with the loss of both our brother-in-law and my father-in-law in a two-month period, a significant bout of double pneumonia, and the loss we shared of many long-time members of our congregation who had become good friends.

In times like these, I'm tempted to put my head down and push through, focusing on work. It didn't happen this time. I found myself more deeply affected physically and emotionally than I have been in the past. The compound interest of stress and sorrow caught up with me. Through times of reflection in prayer and in dialog with colleagues and leaders here at Hope, I began to practice "being still" and listening to the call to "fear not (don't be anxious)." I have experienced anew the warmth and joy of our congregation in ways that have blessed and encouraged me. Rather than leaving me drained or anxious, the events of the year have fixed my eyes on the future and the exciting journey ahead.

The author of Hebrews reminds us, "therefore, since we are receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken, let us be thankful, and so worship God acceptably with reverence and awe, for our 'God is a consuming fire'" (from Deut. 4:23-24). We are called to remember to "keep the main thing the main thing." That is, glorify God, lean into and live out of the grace God has offered us in Jesus Christ, and do it *together*.

One body (the Church) with one head (Christ) expressed in and through us, a congregation that is engaged in our mission to Know Christ and Make Christ Known throughout the region, anchored and launched from three locations.

As I conclude this report, having struggled with how it should begin, I find my mind overflowing with expressions of thanksgiving and joy that YOU, my faith family, have birthed in me. The year ahead will be filled with much work but greater joy. It will be filled with new people to love, to serve, to share the gospel with. So let us be enthusiastic (en-theus....filled with God) about what is in store, tempered by the past and focused on our future.

2022 Annual Report of Pastor Dillman

Dear people of Hope Lutheran Church,

As I write this report, today is January 6, the Feast of the Epiphany. For those of us in the Western Church, today is the day that marks the end of the "12 days of Christmas." Our big feast was 12 days ago when we offered 10 Christmas services at our three campuses spanning Christmas Eve and Christmas Day. While I enjoy the quiet of this Friday morning, I am mindful that Christians throughout the Eastern Church are celebrating the way we did almost two weeks ago. It's not that one way of celebrating is better than the other; it's just a reminder that the feast that celebrates that God was born among us cannot be confined to one day, or even a season, but we celebrate "God with us" throughout the year.

And so, as I reflect on the past year, looking for signs of how God has been "with us" here at Hope, the examples I see are too numerous to count. At a time in history when so many churches in our country and around the world are making heart-breaking decisions to shutter their doors or, best case scenario, merge with another church, we find ourselves growing in both faith and numbers. It was just a few short years ago when we had one campus at the corner of Morse Blvd and CR 466, and now look at us—three campuses, with new people coming through the doors of each campus every week. We are indeed blessed; but with blessing comes the responsibility as disciples of Christ to spread the good news of the gospel of Jesus to all those who walk through our doors—and, perhaps more importantly, even to those we meet outside our doors.

Several years ago, when our number of campuses began to expand, the council and the leadership at the time decided to have the called pastors rotate around to the three campuses, rather than a concentrated presence of a pastor at only one campus. Perhaps the greatest blessing of being at all three of Hope's campuses is the ability to see and welcome, at all campuses, new visitors, new members, and those who are discerning what they want from church. I am overjoyed to see vitality and experience strong faith and community at each of our three campuses. We are indeed quite blessed.

Although my primary responsibilities center around preaching and teaching—both of which I see as blessings God has called me to do—I have also been humbled to be part of the weekly food pantry ministry staffed by nearly 60 volunteers who have taken seriously Jesus' call to serve him in the "least of these." Thank you for all your donations and to our volunteers—everything you do helps keep this vital ministry of Hope Lutheran Church alive and thriving.

In addition to my ministry here at Hope, I continue to serve on the board of Love INC (Love in the Name of Christ) where I serve with other brothers and sisters in Christ to help those in need transform their lives from poverty to healthy living. Additionally, I serve the Florida-Bahamas Synod as a member of the worship planning committee and the diakonia oversight committee. I am truly blessed with many opportunities to serve Christ in this place at this time.

Recently, the daily lectionary reading was the story of Moses and the burning bush, where God asked Moses to remove his shoes because he stood on holy ground. So many of you have invited me into your lives and have shared deeply of your faith and your spiritual journey. Often, I feel that you have invited me onto holy ground. Thank you for your trust and your support, and may God bless each of you in this new year.



- Approved and hired full-time Communications Director Marina Ernst.
- Approved and hired part-time Food Pantry Operations Manager Debbie Schuettler.
- Consulted with Council Treasurer and staff bookkeeper to keep Council updated on monthly budget and spending.

As this is my final letter as President of the Hope Lutheran Church Congregational Council, I want to thank you all for the support and encouragement you have shared with me over my term. I am especially grateful for the care and love you have shared with me and my wife Sarah, as I have faced health issues in the last year.

2022 Special Congregational Meeting Minutes

October 7, 2022

- A quorum was established. (We needed 99 members in attendance). There were 278 in attendance.

Opening Prayer: Pastor Bruce Dillman

Agenda:

- To approve the Hope South Campus Building Project
- To approve the 2023 Operating Budget

A brief overview of the Hope South Campus Building Project was presented. Questions were answered.

The ballot stated: Approve constructing the Activity Center Phase and obtaining design/engineering contracts for the Main Building Complex (design phase), as presented with a projected budget to exceed \$1,650,000 and also approve the \$1,000,000 Line of Credit First Mortgage Loan from Mission Investment Fund in accordance with the attached Resolution from Mission Investment Fund. Paper ballots were collected. The results were:

• 275 ballots cast. There were 262 yes, 13 no. Project Approved.

Mary Jo Vitale MacLean led the congregation in singing the Doxology.

Gary Hill, Treasurer gave a brief overview of the proposed 2023 Operating Budget. Gary explained why we were seeking approval of the budget early. This year the Stewardship Campaign will be connected with the Capital Campaign. Questions were answered. Paper ballots were collected. The results were:

• 268 ballot cast. There were 249 yes, 19 no. Budget Approved.

2022 Financial Highlights

2022 was a year of recovery from the pandemic years of 2020 and 2021. The Current and Benevolence offerings increased by over \$150,000 from 2021 and were \$23,000 over what was budgeted. The total General Fund expenses were kept at 98% of the budgeted amount, resulting in a surplus to the General Fund of \$11,654 for the year. Because of the large surplus carried over from 2021, we were able to establish an equipment replacement fund of \$100,000 and transfer \$100,000 to the Building Fund.

The donations to the Donor Restricted Funds (Food Pantry, The Rock, Scholarships, etc.) were down by \$63,000 from 2021, but they were still able to contribute over \$205,000 to the needs of people in the community by drawing down on some of the ample accumulated balances in their respective Funds.

The Building Fund received over \$500,000 in donations this year with almost half being for capital projects including the Third Site and the Hope Lake Weir Campus pavilion. There were over \$90,000 worth of capital expenditures from the Fund including architectural fees for the Third Site and a pavilion and Memorial Garden at Hope Lake Weir Campus. The balance was contributed to the Debt Service Fund with \$72,000 being paid for interest on the Mortgage Loan and \$200,000 being paid or allocated to be paid on the principal balance. The current Loan balance is now down to \$1,755,874.

With continued recovery and growth, along with the excitement from activity on the Third Site, we are looking forward to another positive year in 2023.

Hospitality / Head Cook - Chef

The Hope Lutheran Church Hospitality Team plans, coordinates, and prepares all food-related events at Hope to include Hope Central Campus as well as Hope Lake Weir Campus and certain hospitality supplies for Hope South Campus meeting at Everglades. Hope Lake Weir Campus has a regular Sunday refreshment time after service, with the first Sunday of the month being Ice Cream Sundae Sunday. Hope South Campus meeting at Everglades now has regular refreshments after each service on Sunday. This year, we were able to provide refreshments and both of these locations during Angel Tree Giving Weekend and on Christmas Eve. Additionally, for the Advent services, a hot appetizer meal was prepared for the Hope Lake Weir Campus Blessing of the Greens service and hot cocoa and cookies were prepared for the Lessons and Carols Advent service at our south property on Meggison Road.

Our events include simple coffee and Danish for certain bible study groups up to and including feeding nearly 500 folks at the yearly picnic in October. The weekly social suppers average 110 to 160 fed with approximately 18 to 20 volunteers assisting with preparation, cooking, serving, and cleanup. Thanksgiving and Christmas social suppers saw 185 to 240 people attending the

meals. This team also is responsible for the monthly Men of Hope breakfast, Women of Hope breakfast, preparation of sandwiches for all funerals, pastor installation receptions, group ministry retreats, choir breakfast/lunch events for many of their weekend special performances, and quarterly STS breakfast meetings, plus Newcomer Appetizers and dinner support each quarter.

The Hospitality team provides hot food and beverages all Christmas Eve afternoon and into the evening during the numerous performances for staff, volunteers, traffic police officers, and parking team. We also provide Easter morning breakfast for the choir, staff and volunteers. Refreshments are provided during the Angel Tree weekend. The team also provides cookies and hot beverages after each Cantata performance in December. We continue to support Gatherings of Hope with beverages and light snacks plus preparing breakfasts and lunches for several training events.

At the Christmas social supper, we had a great time with an Ugly Christmas Sweater contest with numerous participants.

In 2022, the Hospitality Team added the following new events:

- Refreshments for weekly My Time meetings
- o Breakfast and lunch for Pinelands Conference for Women of Hope
- Sunday morning hot pastries and coffee at Hope Central Campus between services

- Pizza party benefits for our ministries
- Summer church wide potluck at Hope Central Campus
- Summer samplers to try out new foods
- Stephen Ministers graduation reception
- o Ice cream socials, dessert socials
- Lunch provided prior to annual meeting events

As you can see, Hospitality has been quite busy as we offer various food events to foster fellowship, friendship, and spread the love of Christ. We are looking forward to an even busier 2023 at all three of our locations.

We gratefully added 12 new regular team members and 4 "part-time" team members over the 2022 year.

As I have always said, in my nearly 5 years with the Hope Hospitality Team, the strength of the hospitality team lies in the many dedicated and hard-working volunteers who weekly come in to cook, prep, clean, clear tables, decorate, serve, wash dishes and do whatever is necessary to make the food events successful. We are truly blessed in the talents of those who have owned their own restaurants in the past and have had other extensive cooking experiences. No words can ever thank them properly for what they do in a very hectic and hot environment in the

kitchen. With only a head cook on full-time staff, they are the backbone of this team. We consider ourselves one big family as we work together, laugh and cry together, and support each other daily.

We are always ready to welcome new members to the team as we continue to grow this ministry and add new events.

Music

Last year at this time, I was telling of how, post-Covid, groups from Hope's campuses were building membership back up. The south site had begun a fledgling choral program, rounding out traditional singing ensembles at all three locations.

I am happy to report that numbers have either now met or exceeded our pre-Covid department membership. In fact, we have expanded group leadership in different areas to help meet demand. Allow me to break it down...

At Hope Central Campus, the Voices of Hope has a current roster of 76 people joining us throughout the 9-month liturgical season. The Sisters in Song, our women's ensemble has 24 members, with our men's group, the Brotherhood of Harmony clocking in at 18 singers. At Hope Lake Weir Campus, Dennis Kienitz leads the VOH-LW with a group of 15 currently.

Last year, the Voices of Hope-South (VOH-S) was begun. This year, its leadership was officially taken over by Mary Jo Vitale-MacLean and has grown to 10 singers. Additionally, the leadership mantle of the Spirit Ringers-Central (SR-C) was officially passed on to Jeen Harper, who had previously acted in a volunteer assistant capacity. That group now lists 16 regular ringers.

One other notable mention is the 95 vocalists who volunteered to join in the annual Christmas Cantata. Aside from a majority of members of other groups, we are blessed to have additional folks from the congregation at large, as well as extended family and community singers join us. At present, two singers even join us annually from Michigan, who travel down each year to specifically sing in our early December presentation.

The end of 2022 also brought a transition for the Hope Central Campus 4:00pm service. Currently, we are beginning a temporary rotation of song leadership. This gives us a chance to put different voices in front of that congregation to facilitate worship while simultaneously beginning the process of locating and hiring a new permanent leader for that service. At this time, many questions of who that may ultimately be, changes they may choose to implement, and/or how soon it could take place are all up in the air. Yet, we are excited and hopeful for whatever new season God may orchestrate. For the time being, we encourage 4:00pm folks to enjoy the variety of offerings.

The Department of Music Ministries at Hope has consistently benefited from the amassed talents of so many. Our roster of staff and volunteers run the engine that keeps music administration going, coordinates with pastoral and AV teams, provides accompaniment, well-rehearsed ensembles and/or capable song leadership for every campus service, as well as seeing to the on-going care and concern of choir members. Each individual is a vital cog in our ministerial machine.

I have always counted it a humbling privilege to oversee such a stellar group of God's children. More than a collective of talents, it is the heart of each individual, in passionate pursuit of Christlikeness, that continues to inspire and propel me in my role as Director of Music Ministries.



All were accomplished. In time, additional men and women joined the CIA. In the year 2022, CIA became more active.

January - small groups such as singles and couples, continued with Hope South Campus folks, e.g. bible groups, dinner social suppers, etc. The number varied from month to month. January dinner was twenty-three people. (This expanded to five separate groups, with the idea to promote to the other two campuses.)

February - Three bible groups were set up, the total number of people varied.

February - Chili Cook Off/Stuff the Truck was held at Hope Central Campus on Wednesday evening, February 23rd -- 247 people approximately. To benefit Hope Lake Weir Campus Food Pantry.

March - Music Remembrance Jazz Trio, on the 24th -- 150 people.

April - Hope Lake Weir Campus Spruce Up Day on the 30th -- 27 people attended. Crosses painted in front and back on the building.

May - Christian Night of Comedy on the 20th -- 407 people, congregation and outside folks attended. Promote Hope for the Future Scholarship Fund.

June – Partnered with Mission Outreach Team/Fred O'Brien for the movie "No Vacancy" which was held on the 23rd and 24th. Approximately 125-130 each night

November – Pizza Night was held on the 9th – over 175 people participated. This event benefited the Hope Lake Weir Campus Food Pantry.

December was a great month for activities. The Crosses at Hope Lake Weir Campus were replaced, LED lights added (outside crosses). They can be seen both from the road and from the lake side. Also, the construction of the Pavilion was under way. Pastor John LeCain shared the plans for further enhancing this location.

Disaster Preparedness and Response Committee

This committee was authorized by the Church Council in May 2022. The purpose of the Committee is to develop and manage a strategy for protecting the facilities, members, and guests of Hope Lutheran Church, as well as to define how we respond in the event of a disaster or in-house emergency. The scope of the effort includes all three campuses. The committee

was formed and started work immediately. The committee is composed of members with experience in facilities management and emergency services. The Church Administrator and Building Maintenance Manager are also on the committee.

The committee, working in cooperation with our local emergency personnel, considered the events that need to be addressed (including medical emergencies, weather-related, interruptions in utility services, computer malfunctions, and entry of an intruder.) They prioritized the risks associated with each category and allocated energy to the most severe.

Since many events might require protecting congregants from external forces, a strategy was developed to keep us safe without requiring an emergency evacuation. Plans include making windows and doors stronger and focusing our security officers on the highest risks. There may still be a time when evacuation is the only alternative, and the plan includes procedures to do that safely.

The committee developed the first "Disaster Preparedness and Response Plan' for Hope Lutheran Church that was put in place in December. Updates and additions to the plan will continue. A copy is available by request to the church office. Volunteers with relevant experience are invited to join the committee.

St. John-Hope Endowment Fund

As of the writing of this report, the year-end financials were not available. Please see the Balance Sheet report for Hope Lutheran Church found earlier in this annual report.

This has been an exciting year for the St. John-Hope Endowment Fund committee. We met six times approving the following grants:

- January \$1,500 Grant to Hope's 3 diaconal students (Peg Piper, Kathy Smith, and Peggy Torda)
- April \$5,000 grant to Ken Wood to continue graduate studies
- October \$5,000 grant to Florida-Bahamas Synod for Hurricane Relief
- December \$5,000 grant as an early gift to Hope's Capital Campaign for construction of the activities center at the southern site.

In June a Legacy Weekend was held with a guest preacher, Pastor Ana Lugo, a gift planner from the ELCA Foundation. A soup and salad meal was held on a Wednesday, June 29, with her giving a presentation on methods to use in making estate gifts. She has worked with several Hope members to plan for their legacy gifts.

The highlight of the year was the approval by congregation council of a continuing resolution for the formation of a Theological Education Fund to be administered by the Endowment committee. This fund will be funded by Hope's membership and is intended to assist persons attending seminary. This was the inspiration of a Gary and Carol Forrester who are members of Hope Lutheran Church.

The committee regretfully accepted the resignation of Frank Livingston. He resigned due to family health issues. He was a valued member of the committee.

Food Pantry at Hope Lake Weir Campus

Hope's Food Pantry fills a vital need of feeding the hungry and meeting some of the needs for the people in the Summerfield area. Our Food Pantry is open every Thursday from 10:00am to 12:00pm. This past year we fed an average of 175 families per week (over 600 individuals). A total of 5,387 visits were made to the Food Pantry as of October 2022.

This ministry requires the assistance of the Hope congregation and staff as well as



organizations in the community. Over 70 volunteers are needed with an average time spent of 400 hours per month. 4815.25 volunteer hours were logged Jan-Dec 1, 2022.

The process requires volunteers in the following capacities: Purchasing food from First Step Food Bank in Ocala (19 cents per pound), ordering food from US foods and volunteer shoppers in local stores, transportation of food from Hope Central Campus to Hope Lake Weir Campus, stocking shelves, filling bags of groceries and toiletries, registering clients, distributing food to the clients. Food is loaded and brought to Hope Lake Weir Campus by one of our volunteers. Donations of food and money have been generously given from our members. Food is moved to Hope Lake Weir Campus on our trailer (purchased through a donation) by volunteers. The food is inventoried and stocked by volunteers.

Distribution of the food on Thursdays requires volunteers who bag groceries and transport to the client's vehicles. Clients are registered and offered refreshment and sometimes referred to agencies with other support services.

Our donated items include non-perishable items, some meat and fresh vegetables or fruit and bread (donated from Panera bread and picked up each week by volunteers). Baked goods are donated by Publix. We receive fresh vegetables from Villages Grown. We also have a member of Hope who contributes hot dogs and buns and delivers them to the pantry. This past year we provided 148 Easter meals, 208 Thanksgiving Turkey meals, Christmas meals and a toy for each child in the family. Special treats are distributed on Holidays. Toiletries are distributed the 1st of every month. The cost of food in each set of bags is approximately \$15 and \$14 for the toiletries.

We continue to be blessed with Hope's support of the food pantry. The Food Pantry volunteers continue to look for ways to meet the needs of the local community and expand the ministry. As the food pantry responsibilities continue to mount, after three years of leadership, the food pantry will now be directed by a paid staff person, Deb Schuettler.

First Visit Calling

This past year for first time visitors, I have contacted 50 families and have had positive conversations with many of them. In the last couple of months my numbers have been reduced since Pastor Rani has taken over calling those who have visited our Hope South Campus at Everglades.

This last year we have really made an attempt to reach our members of whom we have not seen for a while. After attempting to reach many of them after the first of the year and not reaching many of them by phone, we sent out letters asking them to respond in regard to their plans. This summer, we then attempted to reach 150 families whom we had not seen since May and we were able to reach most of them except 39 households. Some of them have not been in the area, some were still hesitant to come because of COVID, and others admitted they had become lazy. Some of whom I talked to shared health issues or other needs that we as a church family should be aware of but they had not thought to inform us. I used that opportunity to share with them the various resources that we have but they declined any of them. We are now just starting a new list of members we have not seen since October and will be doing this on a regular basis.

I had been given a list of names of individuals who wanted to participate in reaching our inactive members. I had emailed each one with a meeting date to discuss how to contact these members but unfortunately, I did not hear back from a single individual. There is a member that has assisted me and am very grateful for her help. I continue to enjoy to be a part of this ministry.

Funeral Reception Team

The Funeral Reception Team provides food and beverages for a luncheon after a funeral/memorial service. We provide this service at church. Our goal is to relieve the family during a memorial service of the worry of serving their guests a lunch following a service.

The Covid restrictions were lifted so we were able to serve 20 luncheons for members in the Fellowship Hall. Debbie Bennett and her Team prepare the sandwiches and the Funeral Reception Team members provided salads, veggie trays, cheese trays, and cookies. There is a special team that provides the workers to setup, serve the food, and cleanup. We are a group of 100+ members with five team coordinators, four for food, and one for Setup. Each member is asked to bring in food for a luncheon or help with setup 4-5 times a year. Please call the church office if you would like to join this team.

Memorial Gardens

Hope Lutheran Church has memorial gardens at Hope Central Campus and Hope Lake Weir Campus. The gardens are beautiful and tranquil settings for family members to inter and memorialize their loved ones. They bring comfort, a sense of peace, and a time of reflection for those who visit. This ministry is available to members of Hope, as well as non-members.

The options for interment are scattering of cremains, in-ground burial, and above ground burial in a columbarium niche.

In 2022, there were seventeen sales at Hope Central Campus, five of which were to non-members. Eight of the sales were columbarium niches, six were in-ground plots, and three were for spreading of cremains. Most sales have been to people who are doing preplanning. This allows them choices for their final

disposition, as well as easing stress on family members at time of death.



Interments in 2022 numbered twenty-four at Hope Central Campus and two at Hope Lake Weir Campus. The memorial gardens continue to be an important ministry for Hope.

Mission Outreach

The main function of the mission outreach team is to support projects that enhance Hope's mission statement which is "to know Christ and to make Christ known" globally, nationally and locally. You may give without loving but you cannot love without giving.

The projects this team supported personally and through our congregation in 2022 are:



- The ELCA Florida-Bahama Synod (FBS) which provides information, support, and financial assistance to companion synod programs in Guyana, Haiti, Cuba, Suriname and Jamaica. Pastors that are serving in Haiti and Suriname have developed a close relationship with Hope. Pr. Kathryn Carroll of the FBS preached and thanked Hope in January for their generous support to this ministry.
- ELCA World Hunger and Disaster Response are two agencies that are effective in providing assistance during a period of need for others around the globe. MO Team members collected Lenten Boxes and Easter meals for 135 families for World Hunger. In September, Pr. Lisa Kipp from the ELCA preached and thanked Hope for their generous donations to the Lutheran World Relief, for hurricane victims and for Ukraine.
- Hopes Lake Weir Campus food pantry helps those in need of food and other necessities
 of life who reside in the area of Hope Lake Weir Campus. In addition to funds, some MO
 members have volunteered extensively at the food pantry.
- Global Health Ministries (GHM) which is an agent to provide financial assistance in materials to Lutheran health care programs throughout the world.
- Love INC (Love In the Name of Christ) is a partnership between many local churches.
 This organization is a clearing house for those in need and will assist to find the correct service agencies. Love INC provides a faith based environment for all those that are helped. Hope Lutheran Church has volunteers working in many areas of their ministry to the local community.
- The Rock at Lake Weir Middle School. The Rock is a Hope Lutheran Church / School
 partnership that provides a food, clothing, hygiene products and school supply pantry in
 the school to share the Love of Christ with needy children in the school and their
 families.

- World Mission Prayer League (WMPL) which provides financial and spiritual support for missionaries.
- Christians in Action (CIA). We Liaison with the CIA group to support and promote social and outreach activities.
- New Outreach Initiatives for Hope South Campus. The MO Team organized a tour of the Christian Care Center (CCC) in Leesburg and arranged for the producer of the "No Vacancy" movie to show the moving CCC story to 200 attendees in June. Additional ministries are being proposed to the congregation for 2023.

Pastoral Care

Pastoral Care is a staff ministry of Hope Lutheran Church that employs four "retired" pastors each working part-time to provide full-time Pastoral Care ministries to the family of Hope and the community. This, of course, is in addition to the care provided by Hope's three full-time Pastors. The ministries provided include visitation, which often includes Holy Communion, anointing, scripture, prayer, and conversation with members and friends in hospitals, hospice

Generally, the ministries are provided to those who are experiencing special needs (physical, spiritual, emotional, family, or other distresses) or who are unable for various reasons to avail themselves of worship and other ministry opportunities that the family of Hope provide. The Pastoral Care Ministers are also regularly involved in worship as Presiders, Holy Communion Assistants and as Preachers. Pastoral Care is involved in funeral ministries and in other team ministries of Hope.

Stephen Ministry

"Christ Caring for People through People"

Stephen Ministers are trained members of our congregation that meet weekly, one-to-one with a hurting individual to provide spiritual care. The hurt can be anything: a terminal diagnosis, grief over a loss, surgery, financial difficulties, family challenges, loneliness, or a questioning of faith. The Stephen Minister provides a listening ear and a caring heart to accompany the care receiver on their journey. Everything is confidential. The non-judgmental Stephen Minister can help the hurting one unburden, deal with difficult feelings, and work through complicated situations.



This fall, Hope hosted the initial 50 hours of training (seven consecutive Saturdays, 9:00am to 4:00pm) for 13 new Stephen Ministers. Seven were from Hope Lutheran Church and the other six from three local congregations that participate in our network coalition. The newly commissioned ministers brought our total up to 18. Throughout the year we provided distinctively Christian care to 20 care receivers from our congregation and the community. Barb Hill participated in a nine week Zoom class and was commissioned as a Stephen Leader in

August. Our other leader, Marsha Anderson retired in November. We deeply appreciate her experience and wisdom and will miss her as she moves to other ministries at Hope.

As part of our outreach, we have a Stephen Minister available at the Hope Lake Weir Campus Food Pantry to provide spiritual care, listen, and pray with the clients. A heartfelt thanks to Nora Steenson for her faithful service.

Journeying through Grief booklets (series of four) were mailed out to 51 surviving household during 2022 (as of Thanksgiving). The recipients are spouses who lost a mate and parents who lost a child. Pastor Bob Knepel, who handles this effort continually receives notes and emails of thanks for the booklets. Recipients find the booklets on target and helpful. The series of Grief books and the *Cancer, Now What?* book have proved to be a useful ministry. The grief books are sent on a specific cycle to our grieving members. The cancer book is an outstanding resource that contains practical, down-to-earth information to help someone and their family members upon getting a diagnosis of cancer. Cancer books are available at all three campuses. Our Stephen Ministry provides these books and suggests a \$10 donation.

Providing Christian Care is a unique and rewarding ministry. Christ cares for people through us. What a wonderful way "To Make Christ Known". Please contact me if you feel called to learn more about our Stephen Ministry.

WE SUPPORT CHURCHWIDE ORGANIZATIONS

As a tenet of WELCA (Women of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America) we maintain our relationship through support and participation in conferences, gatherings, programs, and projects.

Recently, our Women of Hope members attended the Fall Gathering of the Florida-Bahamas Synodical Women's Organization (SWO) and earlier in the year, hosted, here at Hope, the Spring Gathering of the Pinelands Conference, coordinating activities for over eighty women of participating ELCA churches.

WE ENGAGE IN OUTREACH THROUGH CRAFTING

Women of Hope is proud to support all our caring, creative, and talented crafters. Meeting regularly, these dedicated ladies create hundreds of hand-made items that are distributed throughout our church, community, and world-wide.

The Crafters' Sojourn Bears and Comfort Bears bring comfort to cancer patients and children in trauma settings. Hats and sweaters for children in need and First Time Visitor Crosses for newcomers to our church.

The Prayer Shawls Ministry produce hundreds of prayer shawls, lap robes, and pocket prayer patches to be included in Angel Tree gifts, given to the girls at Camp E-Nini-Hassee, and to church members at all three campuses, local nursing homes, and hospice centers.

MISSION AND OUTREACH — We accomplish our services in the name of Our Lord in a variety of ways through:

- Shepherd's LightHouse, a residential mission for homeless single mothers and children located in Belleview.
- Infant and Toddler Pantry, provides supplies, clothing, diapers, and essentials to families in crisis, located at the Congregational Church in Summerfield.
- Camp E-Nini-Hassee, an outdoor residential camp for troubled teenage girls (ages 12-18) in Floral City.
- SOZO Kids, a program that provides the necessary means in helping children receive supplies and essential needed items.
- Hope's Heroes, established this past year as our newest ministry to help our church and the community. This is located at Hope Lake Weir Campus. Our bookshelf is stocked with Christian books and bibles for children of all ages. Also included are activity bags for use during church services.

LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF (LWR)

- Quilters The quilts made are sent each year through Lutheran World Relief to countries
 in need across the globe. This year, 105 quilts have been packed and shipped. Some of the
 quilts are also shared with local agencies in the Tri-County area. These quilts are used in
 many ways by the recipient and are appreciated by those who receive them.
- School Kits Each year the Women of Hope assemble 80 school kits with specific items
 collected for each bag and shipped overseas. Each bag is assembled with the same exact
 items, using essential items to help break the cycle of poverty. This ensures that each
 recipient receives uniform items that are useful to their situation.

BREAKFAST AND LUNCH MEETINGS AND ACTIVITIES

During this past year we have strived to include different venues for the monthly Breakfast Meeting which is held on the third Thursday of each month from September through May. During the months of June, July, and August the "Out to Lunch Bunch" meet at an area location/restaurant.

Women of Hope plans a yearly retreat at Luther Springs every spring where, for three days, women can relax and enjoy fellowship and participate in activities to renew our spirits and listen to some inspirational talks.

At Women of Hope, there are seven active Circles/Bible Study Groups who operate independently, choosing materials to study and discuss and share ideas and fellowship. More small groups are forming, and our members can either join an existing one or form their own.

We stay true to our Mission statement "to mobilize women to act boldly on their faith in Jesus Christ."

The mission of these Ministry Teams is to provide a welcoming, comfortable, and safe environment for weekly worship and special events, and ensure the smooth running of each worship service.

The teams have responded to changes in worship as we returned from the pandemic. Over the year some new procedures have been adopted and many more familiar routines and procedures have been brought back. The teams have willingly and effectively adopted these changes. Hope Lutheran Church is known for meaningful worship experiences. This positive reputation is largely attributable to the dedicated servants on these teams.



The Altar Angels prepare the altar and lay out the communion elements for every service. They prepare communion elements for more than 1,000 individuals every week including alcohol-free and gluten free options. They also keep the sacramental linens and chalices organized and clean within the sacristy.



The Worship Assistants and Communion Servers assist the Pastors in distribution of the sacramental communion elements. With the aid of the Ushers, servers pay special attention to those who cannot come forward, and those with other special needs like gluten free or alcohol-free elements. The Worship Assistants help

during the service by performing in-chancel duties during services including lighting and extinguishing candles, readings, leading prayer and setting out the elements during the service. As part of the Server team, they also provide communion and Rite of Healing to congregants.



The Greeting Ministry is a wonderful way to serve Hope. All you need is a smile and a pleasant, welcoming attitude. Greeters arrive early for their normal service and greet members and visitors. Most Greeters are asked to serve only once or twice a month on a schedule that is convenient for them.

New Greeters are always welcome.



The Narthex Servers are new, post-pandemic, replacing the time-honored tradition of pew registers -initially with roster checks and now with bar code scanners to record attendance. With a warm, friendly smile they also assist those who don't have a bar code card. They are also key members of the "front-line" of folks who help handle the many queries and requests from our

parishioners. Every weekend there are new opportunities to help someone. One reason we need accurate attendance records is to confirm voting status at congregational meetings.



The Newcomer Welcome team is vital to the continuing growth of the church. They are ready to not only welcome first-time worshippers, but to answer all of their questions including how they might become involved as part of the church. It's critical we provide hospitality to attract new members.



In the busy season, the Parking Lot Ushers help you find a place to park your cart or car. They are particularly helpful for those who need a spot near the door. They are the "Face of Hope" – being the first to welcome folks to worship. This year we celebrate the many years of service by Wayne King as he retires from leadership of this group.



The Usher teams not only assist people as they enter the chancel, but they remain engaged throughout the service. They are particularly critical in guiding worshippers to the front of the church during communion. They also guide Communion Servers to wheelchair or pew-bound communicants who do not choose to move to the front of the church to receive communion, and to the AV

booth if there are individuals there who desire communion. There is strong teamwork between the Ushers and the Communion Server team, both of which take final pre-service instruction from the presiding pastor if there are unique circumstances. The Lead usher coordinates the response to any unusual or emergent situations.



The A/V team balances the sound and lights as worship proceeds and streams the service to a growing internet audience. They continue to be our link to worship for those who can't come to the church in person.

These teams have unique responsibilities: They serve SEVEN TIMES EVERY WEEK. They are responsible for making the worship experience a Holy time in everyone's week. Individuals or couples interested in serving are invited to join one of these teams. Members of these teams can be recognized by the descriptive dangles on their name badges.
