2023 Annual Report of Pastor MacLean, Lead Pastor

Brothers and sisters in Christ and fellow servants in the vineyard,

As I reflect on the past year, my mind and heart are filled with memories both sweet and sorrow-filled, of gratitude for grace experienced, and witnessed and of prayers for mercy and peace in areas of brokenness and violence. For our congregation, it has felt like a year of preparation; the deep breath when jogging before quickening your stride. Many other reports will cover ministries in more detail, but I want to begin with a word of thanks to our Council for their commitment to open dialogue and laying a foundation for the tasks before us as we grow into our third site.

Speaking of that project, I also want to thank all those who have toiled and given so generously for the expansion of ministries around our sites and the founding of Hope South Campus. Key among those are Bob O'Dell and Dale Feit. Their talent, wisdom, and faith-filled dedication to this congregation and project are inspiring and we are grateful.

With all that has happened, I could not write or speak about this past year without discussing in some way my trip to the Holy Land. I was blessed to go on this trip with a group of 42 other pilgrims, including Mary Jo. We visited many historic sites of the faith; everything from the site of the nativity to the birthplace of other saints to the place of the crucifixion and the burial of Christ. We visited places like the Mount of Transfiguration, the Sea of Galilee, and the hill upon which the beatitudes were preached.

There were many places that were more crowded or ostentatious than I would have ever expected or wanted to see, yet it was apparent that the Spirit was moving in and through many of those people present. There are other places where I experienced a profound sense of the presence of God and a renewal of my calling as a pastor. Places that will forever be sacred to me, where we received communion, remembered our baptism, were anointed, and were sent home as evangelists to our community.

I experienced the love of God in times, places, and experiences that had nothing to do with history. I experienced it in the beautiful skyline of Bethlehem as we sought a traditional meal, breaking bread together and hearing from a native of the town called Shepherds. Their ancestors were among the first to hear the Good News that the Messiah had been born, and that they had the privilege and the joy to continue to share this good news with us throughout the world.

I experienced it in the song sung by the group on the bus. I experienced it in the rejoicing of the group, when two who met us late were welcomed in good health, and with much joy. I experienced it in late night conversations filled with laughter and shared life by those whose feet were sore, but whose hearts were full.

I experienced it with a member of the group pushing another in a wheelchair, carrying another's burden, or waiting for one who was hobbled by weariness.

Some of you are wishing you'd gone or could go, if not for the continued brokenness, bloodshed, and bigotry that continues to be rampant in that part of the world. I'll tell you a secret...you don't have to go there to experience these things. In fact, you should experience this kind of joy and calling and blessing and worship and fullness of the presence of God in our community, within our congregation, and amongst our people. Just a few weeks ago, we heard the scripture story about Samuel's call to ministry, where the Lord spoke to him three times in the darkness of night, and he finally responded at the urging of Eli with "Here I am, Lord."

We want to experience the awesome presence, the transforming power, and the saving grace of God, more fully in our midst and our community. It begins with each of us, making ourselves available to the Lord. I encourage you to do so even now. This past year has been fraught with tensions, losses, and sadness. It's been filled with hard work, long days, and sometimes longer nights, but it's also been filled with the joy of community. The hope of the gospel and the peace of Christ presents often in the presence of those who called him Lord.

As we look at the year to come and to our 25th Anniversary Celebration, I ask you to think back over the years all that God has done in, for, and through us as the people of Hope Lutheran Church in The Villages. We look forward with hopeful anticipation to what God is going to do for and through us, for this community, for the kingdom of God, and for the glory of Christ. Each of us has an important role to play. The body is not complete when any of us don't love and serve as we are able and we stimy the flow of God's blessings and grace that the Spirit desires to work through our congregation.

There are myriad opportunities to serve and grow in our life together. In the coming months, there will be many more which we will hear about through our Ministry Fair and Stewardship Campaign. It is my dearest hope and prayer as your pastor that many people will speak of their experiences of God and the presence of the spirit in our congregation as those who visited the Holy Land did on our pilgrimage.

As we continue to update, strengthen, and find fresh ways to utilize our current Hope campuses, and we look forward with great anticipation to how God will use us at Hope South Campus. Let us remember that the past - with both its triumphs and tribulations - is behind us and look forward to what each of us can do for the sake of the gospel in the future. Even more importantly, let us look forward to what we can do together as the people of God, and hopefully in the year to come.

2023 Annual Report of Pastor Dillman, Associate Pastor

What a gift it was to serve the people of Hope Lutheran Church during the past year! There are so many exciting things happening at our parish that it is difficult to know where to begin. However, since my greatest joy is to serve as presider and preacher at our Sunday Eucharist at each of our three campuses, let me talk about the many joys I have experienced at each of our three thriving campuses—three campuses but one Hope!

At Hope Lake Weir Campus, the growth and vitality of this worship community is clear each Sunday. With a dedicated choir and under the direction of Dennis Kienitz, the music each week reflects the joyful noise you will find each week when this community gathers to worship. Weekly, we find new visitors coming through our doors, and many new members to Hope during 2023 were at Hope Lake Weir Campus. There have been a growing number of people who have moved into the neighborhood who come to "check us out," and with the growth of housing in the area, we have more opportunity than ever to preach the good news of Jesus' gospel to new ears. Some people coming to our Sunday worship are clients from our Food Pantry, and we always welcome them with open arms.

Speaking of the Food Pantry, this ministry is without a doubt an expression of the gospel-centered faith of our members at Hope Lake Weir Campus. Although our volunteers come from all three campuses, all the people at Hope Lake Weir campus are proud of this ministry and are excited to hear updates about what is going on. The new director of the Food Pantry, Debbie Schuettler, has done a remarkable job over the past year and you can read her report for more details.

Of course, Hope Central Campus remains the hub of most activities at Hope. Since I usually lead our Wednesday evening prayer service, Anita and I try to be at most of the Wednesday evening social suppers. These social suppers serve as more than an opportunity to feed people—the people who gather here each week include not only parishioners from all three campuses, but many visitors and guests who come and share in this life-giving fellowship. This weekly supper offers yet another opportunity for our members to share the gospel by the way they welcome all people. Debbie Bennett and her crew supply delicious and varied menus, as well as hosting activities provided by different ministries in the church, and even though this is not a worship setting, the gathering is certainly a holy one. Our simple Wednesday evening prayer service has slowly grown in attendees, and more people are enjoying the simple yet powerful Vespers or Compline services that the church has held for centuries.

Also at Hope Central Campus, I have been overjoyed with the opportunity to teach as part of H.O.P.E. University. This year I began a 3-year series on Lutheran Worship which began with a 5-part introductory class series during Fall 2023. I am preparing the classes for the 5-part series that I will teach on Wednesdays at 10:00am during Lent. For all of these classes, I am using the 3-volume companion to our worship book, "Evangelical Lutheran Worship," affectionately called "the red book."

Finally, as I focus on the southern campus currently worshipping at Everglades Recreation Center, there is so much going on here that I can't begin to cover it in my report. Thankfully, you will read much more about our newest campus elsewhere in this report. Each week that Anita and I are blessed with worshipping at Hope at Everglades, we come away humbled to be part of this exciting and growing community in the southern Villages. Since residents are rapidly moving into this part of The Villages, we find new people walking through our doors each week. Some are Lutherans looking for a Lutheran church, but many come from various church backgrounds or have no church background at all and like the convenience of worship being offered so close to their homes. Since we worship in borrowed space, our worship space must be set up and torn down each week, and we are beyond thankful for the volunteers who help in this major task. With the help of volunteers, we have not only had people serving as ushers, greeters, and communion ministers, but during the last year we have added a choir, under the direction of Mary Jo Vitale MacLean, a worship assistant, and a reader each week. Those worshipping at Everglades excitedly anticipate having a church building, and we are blessed that the congregation has approved making this dream a reality. It is exciting to imagine the ministry opportunities that will be housed in a new building!

It's early January as I write this, which means that I am now retired. Most retired pastors don't really retire from ministry, and many serve as interim pastors at parishes looking for a new called pastor. I am so very, very blessed that Hope's Council has offered me the opportunity to continue to serve at Hope, which is exactly where I want to be. Although I am giving up an office at Hope, and with that my office hours, I am keeping several of my books and supplies in an office shared by all of Hope's retired pastors. My contract with Hope allows me to do what I most love to do, which is, as my wife Anita puts it, preaching, teaching, and family. I will continue to preach on a rotating basis at our three campuses two weeks each month, teach two class series each year, and lead Wednesday evening prayer most weeks. But I will also have time to travel with Anita and spend time with my family. Most importantly, let me say to you the same thing I said to one of our council members when she asked—yes, I will continue to be your pastor.

I look forward to 2024 and thank God each and every day that He has called me to serve the people of Hope Lutheran Church. May God's choicest blessings be with you this year....

Making Abundant Life Known Capital Campaign

Hope's Making Abundant Life Known Capital Campaign is in full swing! Our dream of constructing the Hope South Campus building in the southern end of The Villages is coming true, thanks to your generous donations and support.

To date, we have received 442 pledges totaling \$2,206,043.00 for Hope South Campus. Our outstanding pledges total approximately \$990,000.

In Fall 2023, Hope was blessed by a Matching Challenge Gift offer of \$200,000 from a congregation member. Our Hope family far exceeded our expectations for the Matching Challenge, raising an additional \$420,963.000 through new pledges, additional pledges, and additional gifts.

A total of \$1.8 million has been contributed towards the Capital Campaign so far.

Greetings From Your Council President

What an eventful and joy-filled year 2023 was for Hope Lutheran Church!

We are meeting the challenges of being a "large church" in every sense of the definition, with more than 2,000 members, three sites, currently two full time and five part time pastors, more than 60 ministries serving both Hope members and surrounding communities, and seven services each weekend as well as a regularly scheduled Wednesday evening Vespers or Compline service.

The growth of Hope Lutheran Church and the commitment to live and minister as *One Church* (though we are three campuses) is bearing fruit for all campuses and for the surrounding communities. Examples include Hope's Food Pantry, The Rock, Grief Support, Stephen Ministry, My Time Caregiver Respite, Angel Tree...and many, many more, the details of which you can learn about in this Annual Report.

The Council of Hope Lutheran Church met more than 15 times during 2023. This included the regularly scheduled monthly meetings as well as a number of special council meetings required to move forward on work on Hope South Campus and the 2024 Budget. Additionally, the nine lay members of your Church Council are active in many of Hope's Ministries and they participate as instructors at H.O.P.E. University, work at the Food Pantry, serve as readers, worship assistants, communion servers, Disaster Preparedness leaders, spearhead social gatherings, and other volunteer opportunities. Their hard work and commitment to the life of Hope Lutheran Church is inspirational to witness.

During the spring of 2023, Hope's Council made the difficult decision to delay ground-breaking on Hope South Campus and re-evaluate the plan forward. It was determined that the wise course would be to begin our building process with the 450 seat Worship Center rather than the smaller Activity Center as was originally planned. Hope's membership came together behind the Council and voted to back that change.

When a donor came forward in the fall to offer a \$200,000 matching gift challenge, the Congregation again stepped up and contributed more than double the dollars necessary to receive the match. Because of the generosity of Hope members and visitors, a total of more than \$420,00 was raised in an eight-week period for a final total of more than \$620,000, proving again that there is strong commitment to the project. This generosity has enabled Hope to set our Groundbreaking for Spring 2024. What a joyful celebration this will be, as Hope continues to spread the Good News across The Villages and local communities.

Though much has been done, more remains to be done, and the love and enthusiasm for serving the LORD is evident among Hope's members. Your Council looks forward to working with you throughout the coming year, and we can't wait to see what 2024 brings.

2023 Annual Meeting Minutes

February 5, 2023

A light lunch was served prior to the meeting, members received their ballots. Dennis Kienitz led the congregation in the Doxology and hymns that warmed our hearts. Pastor John LeCain recognized Education leadership and participants and teased us with upcoming Hope U offerings.

Gloria Johnson recognized the Hospitality Teams

Meeting was called to order by President Kent Hamdorf at 12:03 p.m.

Determination of a Quorum:

Pam Fenn, Council Secretary confirmed that we had a quorum. The constitution states that a quorum for all Congregational Meetings shall be five (5%) percent of the voting members based on the church roll at the end of the prior fiscal year, but not less than fifty (50) voting members. For 2023, a minimum of 99 voting members constitutes a quorum.

The meeting will follow Roberts Rules of Order and Pastor Wayne Kofink was the Parliamentarian.

Agenda:

We will follow the agenda which is on the screens. Motion to approve the agenda was made, seconded. Motion Approved.

Review of the 2022 Annual Meeting Minutes:

(Minutes of Congregational meetings are approved by the congregation. Draft minutes are printed in the Annual Reports, the approved/official copies reside on file in the Church office.)

- 1. Motion was made and seconded to approve the 2022 Annual Meeting minutes. Motion Approved.
- 2. Motion was made and seconded to approve the Special Congregational Meeting minutes held on October 7, 2022. There was discussion. It was brought to the congregations' attention that the word "not" was omitted from the motion. Motion Below is the corrected motion:

Approve constructing the Activity Center Phase and obtaining design/engineering contracts for the Main Building Complex (design phase), as presented with a projected budget not to exceed \$1,650,000 and approve the \$1,000,000 Line of Credit First Mortgage Loan from Mission Investment Fund in accordance with the attached Resolution from Mission Investment Fund Motion was made and seconded to approve the revised Minutes. Motion Approved.

Nomination Committee:

Kent took time to thank the members of the nominating committee for their work. The committee spent many hours and meetings to ensure the nomination process was followed in accordance with our constitution. The committee members were Rolf Moulton, Marsha Lamadrid, Suzanne Kuebler. We will be electing two congregation council officers and one council at-large member.

Election of Congregation and Council Officers and Member-at-Large:

The following members were nominated by the Nominating Committee and affirmed by Council to serve as officers and member-at-large of Hope Lutheran Church for the following terms (According to our bylaws, no further nominations could be made):

Katherine (Kathy) Beekman, President (3-year term) Kristina Giffin, President (3-year term)

Richard Gal, Vice President (3-year term)

The nominee for council officer of Vice President is unopposed and elected by acclimation.

Patrick Sawler, Member-at-Large (3-year term)
The nominee for Member-at-large is unopposed and elected by acclimation.

The two candidates for President were given 5 minutes to speak to the congregation.

President Kent Hamdorf then asked members to cast their paper vote for one of the two candidates.

Kristina Giffin won the election by a majority vote.

Kathy Beekman will retain her Member-at-Large position.

While the vote counting took place the following leaders gave us the good news of ministries here at Hope

Hope South Campus Building Project - Worship Center Phase 1 of the Hope South Campus Building Project:

1. Approve constructing the Worship Center Phase 1 and associated site development, with a projected cost of \$7,850,000, not to exceed \$8,00,000, and approve the anticipated \$4,700,000 construction loan, not to exceed \$4,900,000, as specified in the following resolution.

"WHEREAS Hope Lutheran Church in The Villages, Inc. ("Ministry") proposes to borrow the anticipated amount of \$4,700,000, not to exceed \$4,900,000, through a Loan from the Mission Investment Fund of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America under the following conditions:

- (a) The loan proceeds are to be used for the purpose of the Loan, the building and furnishing of the Worship Center and all related site improvements for the Worship Center, Phase 1 of the Hope South Building Project.
- (b) The loan is to be secured by a first mortgage, or first lien deed of trust or other security instrument, on the real property of the Ministry.
- (C) The loan will be until the end of the construction period at a rate of 6.375 % to be converted to a permanent mortgage loan at that time.

RESOLVED that (a) the Ministry is authorized to borrow the anticipated amount of \$4,700,000, not to exceed \$4,900,000, from the Mission Investment Fund of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, to be used for the foregoing purposes and to be secured by real property of the Ministry as set forth above.

2023 Financial Highlights

The Current and Benevolence offerings increased by \$23,500 from 2022 but were \$150,000 under what was budgeted. The total General Fund expenses were 100% of the budgeted amount, including an unplanned \$130,000 to paint the Worship Center at Hope Central Campus, resulting in a deficit to the General Fund of \$125,000 for the year. Because of this deficit we returned the \$100,000 transferred to the Building Fund in 2022 back to the General Fund.

The donations to the Donor Restricted Funds (Food Pantry, The Rock, Scholarships, etc) were up over \$100,000 from 2022, enabling them to contribute over \$285,000 to the needs of people in the community.

The Building Fund received approximately \$1,800,000 in donations this year with \$1,500.000 being for capital projects including Hope South Campus and the Hope Lake Weir Campus pavilion. There were over \$170.000 worth of capital expenditures from the Fund including architectural fees for Hope South Campus and the pavilion cost at Hope Lake Weir Campus. The balance was contributed to the Debt Service Fund with \$82,000 being paid for interest on the Mortgage Loan and \$186,000 being paid on the principal balance. \$50,000 in interest was earned on the cash balance in the Building Fund. The current Loan balance is now down to \$1,569,734.

With continued growth, along with the excitement from activity on Hope South Campus, we are looking forward to a positive year in 2024.

Hospitality / Head Cook – Chef

The Hope Lutheran Church Hospitality Team plans, coordinates and prepares all food related events at Hope, including Hope Central Campus, Hope Lake Weir Campus, and certain hospitality supplies and refreshments for Hope at the Everglades Rec Center. Hope Lake Weir Campus has a regular Sunday refreshment time after service with the first Sunday of the month being Ice Cream Sundae Sunday. Many of the refreshments are supplied from Hope Central Campus to add to the amazing home-made items brought in by the members there. Hope at Everglades now has regular refreshments of fresh baked cookies after each service on Sunday.

Our events include simple coffee and Danish for certain bible study groups up to and including feeding nearly 500 folks at the yearly picnic in October. The weekly social suppers average 110 to 190 fed with approximately 18 to 24 volunteers assisting with preparation, cooking, serving, and cleanup. This year was a record-breaking traditional Thanksgiving meal serving 280 members. This team also is responsible for the monthly Men of Hope breakfast, Women of Hope breakfast, preparation of sandwiches for all funerals, pastor installation receptions, group ministry retreats, choir breakfast/lunch events for many of their weekend special performances, and quarterly STS breakfast meetings, plus Newcomer Appetizers and dinner support each quarter. The Hospitality team provides hot food and beverages all Christmas Eve afternoon during the numerous performances for staff, volunteers, traffic police officers, and parking team. We also provide Easter morning enhanced refreshments for the choir, staff, and volunteers. The team also provides cookies and hot beverage after each Cantata performance in December. We continue to support Gatherings of Hope with beverages and light snacks plus preparing breakfasts and lunches for several training events.

In 2023, the Hospitality Team added the following new events:

Also at Hope South Campus, the SOS service now periodically uses live piano and guitar, along with MJ's vocals.

2023 brought the return of Ken Wood to the direction of the Hope Central Campus 4:00pm service. With a fresh rebrand and an updated band, the SOS service on Saturday afternoons has shown much promise for offering an engaging alternative style for worship, and one in which we hope to encourage depth, personal commitment, and community interaction.

The department of music ministries continues to have the largest number of volunteers of any Hope ministry, keeping the gears moving. Our 10+ part- and full-time staff could never undertake such a vast course of objectives without the constant involvement of so many committed people. We look forward to continuing as the church and her ministries are steered by Christ toward evermore outreach, devotion, and robustness.



Archive Team

University, and Hope South Campus, we have created a set of leather scrolls to celebrate this, Hope's 25th Anniversary year. So far, three scrolls have been completed: 1995-2005, 2006-2013, and 2014-2021. Present plans call for the

Angel Tree Project

Teams Mission:

Work with designated local organizations to provide Christmas gifts for needy Children and Seniors in our community.

Recent Accomplishments:

Through the overwhelming support of the Hope congregation, the Angel Tree Project provided significant gift packages for nearly 600 Children and Seniors. That represents a 34% increase of those Hope served with Christmas blessings over the Angel Tree project of 2022.

Organizations with counts served included:

- Hope Lake Weir Food Pantry Children 139
- Stanton Weirsdale Elementary School 184
- o Lady Lake Specialty Care 119
- Buffalo Crossings Assisted Care 62
- The Villages Rehabilitation Center 5

Additionally, the congregation provided 85 gift cards (not assigned to specific individuals) that were utilized to augment gifts if needed and to provide for gifts not returned by the date to be distributed to the organizations. The balance as noted below was turned over to the Pastors to be used where needs arise in the future.

In August, Lenea Carnes asked for leadership support to manage the Angels Project. The team of Gloria Johnson, Jenny Dunn, Nancy Forrest, and Elayne Gooding stepped in and lead the project. The team worked with designated leads from the organizations, coordinated volunteer meetings, scheduled coverage for Angels distribution and returns at all three campuses, worked with Hope Staff for communications to Hope members and to schedule facility needs, and tracked all Angels to assure complete coverage of all commitments Hope had made to the groups served.

A special acknowledgment also is due to the team of nearly 50 volunteers from all campuses who assisted throughout the project.

Blessing of the Animals

The team's mission is to provide a pleasant and meaningful experience for members of the community that wish to have their pets (no snakes) blessed. The event is in recognition of the feast day of St. Francis of Assisi, the Roman Catholic Church's patron saint of animals.

The 2023 Blessing of the Animals was held on Saturday, October 7, 2023. Pastor Marc presided over the event. More than 125 pet owners and 77 registered pets were in attendance. In addition, five vendors and their teams provided merchandise for purchase along with several bringing pets that represented their organizations.

Over 30 volunteers worked at the event greeting attendees, registering the pets, handing out pet scarves, blessing collar tags, cookies donated by Hope members, and water and soft drinks donated by the Hospitality Department. Pet photos were taken and sent to the pet owners. Music was provided by the Music Department along with a slide show presentation from last year's event.

Our prize wheel collected \$145 in donations for YOUR Humane Society SPCA and the Columbiana Humane Society in Salem, OH. In addition, a Hope member contributed \$200 to the shared donations.

Many positive comments were received from attendees, vendors, and staff members about the volunteers, the blessing ceremony, and the fun, fair-like atmosphere.

Disaster Preparedness and Response Committee

Disaster Preparedness Committee

The Committee meets regularly and records the following accomplishments for 2023.

- 1. The first ever "Hope Lutheran Church Disaster Preparedness and Response Plan" was approved. Numerous details to implement the plan have been completed including door lock and alarm procedures, preparation of Lead Usher Guidelines, updating contents of First Responder Bags, and installation of signs for emergency equipment.
- 2. Quarterly checks of all facilities have been initiated to confirm emergency exits are clear, protective systems follow inspection requirements, emergency equipment is available, etc. AEDs and First Responder Bags are checked monthly.
- Training was conducted for worship volunteers covering medical emergencies, emergency evacuation, and shelter-in-place protocols. AED/CPR training was also conducted at both campuses.
- 4. Established a prioritized budget and managed to approved budget.

A key objective of this committee is to make sure Hope Lutheran Church is fully compliant with safety and security guides and regulations. The following agencies guide our decisions:

- National Fire Protection Agency
- Federal Emergency Management Agency
- Occupational Health and Safety Administration
- American Heart Association







The Committee completed new sections of the Plan (Infection Control and Key Systems). They installed a TV monitor in the Hope Central Campus Narthex for the Security Officer and have begun

work on monitoring systems updates for Hope Lake Weir Campus. A 2024 version of the Plan was approved in December.

Planned for 2024 is improvement of monitoring systems, training for additional ministries teams and staff, additional security officer staffing at Hope Lake Weir Campus, and continuous reviews and after-action reports of incidents. The Coordinator wants to commend every member of this Committee. They not only contribute their experience and knowledge of security and disaster response, but they willingly step up to implementing the improvements. We particularly acknowledge the extensive contributions of staff members, Bob Franceski and Rick Schaaf.

Endowment

The Endowment Committee is mandated by the Constitution of Hope Lutheran Church. Its purpose is to administer the *earnings* of the funds entrusted in perpetuity to the Hope/St. John Endowment Funds. This is accomplished through grants awarded for religious, charitable, benevolent, and educational purposes of Hope Lutheran Church including capital improvements.

This year saw a significant increase in the fund balance due to the bequest of one of the founding members of Hope. As one can imagine, the educational work of the committee cannot be measured until a bequest is received. Members of the Committee pray that members of Hope will continue to consider the on-going mission of Hope through a legacy gift.

Through the dream of one of the Committee members, the Seminary Educational Fund was established in 2022 within the Hope/St. John Endowment fund to further the seminary education of future leaders of the church. It was established with a \$15,000 gift with no grants being awarded until the fund reached a balance of \$25,000. The congregation was challenged to increase the fund balance so that awards could be made. During 2023, over \$40,000 was added to that fund allowing the committee to make grants.

Hope Lake Weir Campus Food Pantry

The Hope Lake Weir Campus Food Pantry is a thriving ministry serving residents of Marion County every Thursday from 10:00am to 12:00pm. In 2023, the Pantry served 8,273 households, giving out 11,597 bags of shelf-stable food, meat, and produce.

This ministry is thankful for the generosity of the Hope congregation, area clubs, organizations, and neighbor gatherings. Without all this support



throughout the year, the Pantry could not help so many people. The Pantry is also grateful for all the volunteers who work selflessly in so many different areas, logging 8,570.50 hours.

Debbie Schuettler, the Pantry's Operation Manager, is dedicated to making sure donations are used wisely to purchase quality food at reasonable prices. She has worked with Second Harvest in obtaining discounted prices on shelf-stable items, a variety of meats, and donated produce. This alone has saved the Pantry a significant amount of money. Every week we also receive donated breads and pastries from Panera Bread in Lake Sumter Landing and the Southern Trace Publix. The Villages Grown also donates produce when in season.

The Pantry also provided holiday meals for Easter, Thanksgiving, and Christmas. In July, during the Shoe & Sock Drive, we gave away 123 pairs of shoes and socks, along with donated school supplies. For Christmas, 154 food pantry children received gifts from the Angel Tree Program. Through donations, we also provide hot dogs & buns, pet food, diapers, incontinence underwear, and hygiene products.

The Pantry has been blessed to help two other Hope ministries this year. After a successful shoe drive, the Pantry donated over \$300 in shoes to The Rock. We were also able to donate 18 cases of cereal. The Pantry is also helping the On My Own program donating approximately \$645 of apple sauce, juice boxes, fruit cups, and similar items. We hope to continue working with these ministries going forward. The Pantry is grateful for your continued support.

I have made 75 calls to individuals that I was able to reach and left messages of welcome on 35.

I continue to enjoy being a part of this ministry, only surprised by how many find it not important to attend church regularly.

Memorial Gardens

The Hope Lutheran Church Memorial Gardens at Hope Central Campus and Hope Lake Weir Campus continue to be important ministries for the members of Hope Lutheran Church, as well as the surrounding community.

The gardens were designed and developed to provide a place of peace, comfort, and serenity for family members and friends to inter and memorialize their loved ones. The gardens are open 24 hours a day for visitation. They are beautifully landscaped with benches in place for family and friends to spend time reflecting and remembering.

The options for interment include scattering of cremains in a designated area, in-ground burial, and placement in a columbarium niche.



In 2023 there were twenty sales at Hope Central Campus, consisting of three for scattering of cremains, eight for in-ground burial, and nine for columbarium niches. Sixteen of the sales were to Hope members and four to non-members. There was 1 sale at Hope Lake Weir Campus. There were twenty-two interments at Hope Central Campus and 2 at Hope Lake Weir Campus.

In the fall of 2023, it was determined that some of the walkway coating in the Hope Central Campus Garden was deteriorating. The old material was removed, the walkways smoothed, and stained with an attractive design and color to coordinate with the color of the church building.

At this time, we are looking ahead to a plan for the placement of additional columbariums at Hope Central Campus, which will be needed in less than two years. It is likely that the garden will have to be expanded. There is adequate space for in-ground burial for several decades.

Men of Hope

The first meeting re-established the purpose, goals, and direction of the Men of Hope for the 2023-24 ministry period. The Men of Hope established the primary tenets to be service which accomplishes Bible Study, Prayer, Fellowship, and Discussion. This is primarily done through use of guest speakers, involving member's life experiences, growing participant faith, and seeking wisdom and encouragement from one another.

The primary study vehicle for this year is Adam Hamilton's, "The Walk". A compendium of 5 practices for essential Christian living; this book is easy to digest and very powerful in its message. Every Thursday, our dance floor is packed with rhythmic dancing to every genre of music- all in a fun and safe environment.

Newcomer Worship Welcome Team

The NWWT (Newcomer Worship Welcome Team) have been functioning this past year under the leadership of the Team Leader, Ingrid Severson. We continue to conduct our team with the intent to "know Christ and make Christ known" while serving at the Welcome Center at Hope Lutheran Church,

We will continue to function regularly for all services on Saturdays and Sundays throughout the year 2023. Our main goal is to welcome newcomers to our church family as they enter the doors of Hope Lutheran Church for the worship service. The person serving at the Welcome Center answers any questions/concerns posed to them by newcomers. If we are unable to provide an answer, we direct them to a staff member at the desk in the narthex of the church or to the minister officiating at that particular service.

Handcrafted crosses in various colors are offered to newcomers, as well as a Hope Lutheran Church pen as welcome gifts. The crosses are handmade by a group of volunteers who are a part of the Hope Crafters group who meet at the church on Tuesday mornings from 9:00am to 11:00am. These gifts are meant as a token of love and friendship to make each person feel welcome and a part of the church family. The cross is taped to a nametag and worn on the newcomers lapel to indicate to the pew in front and the pew in back of the newcomer that he/she is a first time visitor. In this way, we are all encouraged to welcome newcomers to our church and make them feel a part of the church family. Through generous donations, NWWT has been able to offer small books, coloring books, and crayons and Hope Lutheran Church bears to visiting children. We hope to continue this tradition for many years to come.

We had a total of 7 members in the NWWT who volunteered in 2023 and hope to expand our volunteer list for each service in 2024.

New Member Classes

New Membership continued to thrive at Hope Lutheran Church in 2023 with an addition of one hundred and twenty-six new members. As we continue to grow into three campuses, with a "One Hope" philosophy, our Church Mission," To Know Christ and Make Christ Known" is being shared throughout our community.

On Our Own

We are a group of individuals who are "On Our Own", including single, widowed, or divorced, and we also welcome caregivers with spouses who are not able to be socially active. Our purpose is to provide friendship, support, and fellowship through our monthly meetings, events, local trips, and social activities.

Our major service project has been providing 80 snack packs per month to Stanton-Weirsdale Elementary School in Lake Weir. We recently increased the quantity to 100 packs per month when we learned that the school had a waiting list of children who were in need of help. We pack 11 to 12 individual items (for example peanut butter, jelly, drink, pudding, tuna,



crackers, etc.) into a gallon size storage bag. The school distributes these to needy children at the end of the week so that they have food for the weekend.

We also prepare 30 gift bags annually, which are distributed by our pastors to shut-ins at Christmas.

Our meetings are held the second Wednesday of the month, with assembling of the snack packs at 9:00am, followed by our meeting at 10:30am.

The Rock

Who will go? Here I am Lord, send me.

The Rock at Lake Weir Middle School is sponsored and staffed by Hope Lutheran Church with the support of Love INC.

At Lake Weir Middle School, The Rock provides shoes, food, clothing, school supplies, hygiene products, emotional support and most important, the love of Christ to children in need. About 120 students are helped each week. Some of the children come from broken homes and do not have adequate food, clothing, hygiene products, or emotional support. Others are dealing with family drug problems. Some live in the forest. Some live in cars. Many do not know Christ.

The Rock is a school-church partnership where the school provides space on its campus for Hope to operate our Rock Room. Hope Lutheran Church volunteers operate The Rock at Lake Weir Middle School from 11:00am until 1:30pm on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. School staff open The Rock for the children whenever there is a need.

The volunteers share a report with a love story every day that The Rock is open. Here is a sample of the children we encounter:

Maliki offered to lead the prayer today! We had 40 visitors including some new students brought by the counselors and social worker. The HOT item today was warm clothing. Many students were looking for coats and long pants. Patty is going to see what Love INC can provide in the way of coats and bring them in. We gave away many quilts from our quilters also.

There were many love stories we could share. I could tell you about the girl with a list from her mom. Or the girl who we noticed could not see items on the shelf. I talked to Ms. Joseph and told her that if she would get us the information, we would see that she got an eye exam and glasses.



But the story of the day had to be Eli. He just wanted food, but when Colleen suggested that we may have shoes in his size, his eyes lit up. He said his shoes were hand me downs. When he took off his shoe to try on new ones, we were shocked. It looked like he had been wearing the same shoes and wet socks day and night for a week! The socks went straight to the trash. His new shoes were 2 sizes bigger than what he took off. I have attached a picture of the soles of his shoes. He left with all new clothing and 5 pairs of socks. We talked to Ms. Haynes, the Social Worker, and she came by and picked up more clothing for him.

Stephen Ministry

"Christ Caring for People through People"

Stephen Ministers are trained members of our congregation that help a hurting individual to unburden, deal with difficult feelings, and work through complicated situations. The hurt can be anything: a terminal diagnosis, grief over a loss, upcoming surgery, financial difficulties, family challenges, loneliness, or a questioning of faith. The Stephen Minister offers a listening ear, a caring heart, and creates a safe, confidential, and non-judgmental space to provide emotional and spiritual help.

Hope Lutheran Church hosted the initial training (ten consecutive Saturdays, 9:00am-1:30pm) and graduated 13 new Stephen Ministers.

Three were from Hope and the others from five local congregations that participate in our network coalition. The newly commissioned ministers brought our total up to 18. Throughout the year, twenty-seven individuals benefitted from our distinctively Christian care.

<u>Journeying through Grief</u> booklets (series of four) were mailed out to approximately 66 households who lost a family member. The grief books are sent on a specific cycle to assist the grieving process.

Additionally, the Stephen Ministers made <u>Cancer</u>, <u>Now What?</u> books available at a reduced cost to more than 70 members and friends this past year. The cancer book is an outstanding resource that contains practical, down-to-earth information to help deal with the diagnosis of cancer or another life-altering medical situation. Cancer books are available at all three campuses for a suggested \$10 donation placed in the church offering.

As part of our outreach, we have Stephen Ministers available at the Hope Lake Weir Campus Food Pantry to provide spiritual care, listen and pray with the clients. We also have assisted in administering home communion and visiting shut-ins. A heartfelt thanks to our team for their faithful service. Providing Christian Care is a unique and rewarding ministry. Women of Hope

Our mission to encourage women to act boldly on their faith in Jesus Christ is accomplished in many ways.

Our church unit here at Hope supports and follows the guidelines of WELCA, Women of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, the Florida-Bahamas Synodical Women's Organization (SWO) and the Pinelands Conference. These organizations all provide



resources for leadership skills, Bible Studies, and fellowship through the conferences in which our Women of Hope participate.

For our Breakfast Meetings held on the third Thursday of each month at 9:00am at Hope Central Campus, our Program and Hospitality Teams plan and provide informative, inspiring and entertaining programs intended to interest both our own members at Hope and friends and neighbors in surrounding communities as well.

Although our church is expanding into many geographical locations, it is still a blessing to provide meaningful activities that can be reached in a reasonable time from one campus to another. Over the course of the year, our Hospitality Coordinator reports over 600 attendees, not including our three summer Out to Lunch Bunch events. Our Mission Ministry is divided into several Outreach Teams, each supporting different worthy causes, both locally and world-wide. Some of our most active outreach groups are the talented and dedicated Crafters, Quilters, and Prayer Shawl Ministries.

On a designated Sunday, hundreds of Sojourn Bears, Care Bears, and all other handcrafted items will be displayed and blessed at the altar at all three campuses for distribution and delivery to those in need locally and around the world through Lutheran World Relief School Kits and Quilters Programs.

This year, the Prayer Shawl Ministry, for example, reports providing over 50 shawls and lap ropes at all three campuses, also to those attending the Blue Christmas Service and 250 prayer patches for the Angel Tree Project and Welcome Table.

The Mission Team provides support to such local charities as the Infant & Toddler Pantry, Shepherd's LightHouse, for women and children needing shelter, E-Ninni-Hassee, a great young women outdoor camp and rehabilitation center, and Forward Paths housing program for youth.

This year, a special corner was set aside for Hope's Heroes, supplying children's Bibles, coloring books and other seasonal religious items to be used by our youngsters attending services.

Besides our participation in WELCA conferences, we hold our own annual 3-day retreat at Luther Springs where attendees have the opportunity for spiritual renewal, comradery, and relaxation in beautiful woodland surroundings.

This fall, on our own Hope Lake Weir Campus, we held a one-day retreat where the schedule included an inspirational guest-speaker, small-group discussions, a lovely lunch at the outdoor pavilion, and a walk through the newly-created labyrinth.

As our membership increases, so does our need to develop closer relationships. Circles/Bible Studies are continually being created. The Women of Hope welcome you to join our journey of spiritual growth in whichever ways the Lord is leading you.
